Perhaps he has an unofficial agony aunt, whose advice he seeks on what to wear. Or maybe he's formed a close bond with his female boss, who's helping him scale the career ladder. These women will play a role in his life you can't fulfil, and while you might resent the time your boyfriend spends in their company, you should consider the benefits.

"One of the advantages is that your partner gets a 'female perspective'," says Andrew G Marshall, author of Help Your Partner Say "Yes": Seven Steps to Achieving Better Cooperation and Communication, "So, on subjects such as sex, he might be getting sensible thoughts from them rather than his mates."

You might loathe the idea of him discussing sex with another girl, but thanks to her, he knows the importance of foreplay and neck kisses. Really, when you think about it, she could be your NBF in disguise.

Make New Friends

"Enlisting his female bestie as an ally can provide you with a friend you're likely to have lots in common with," says Li Kun Qi, a relationship and life coach. "After all, you even like the same guy, just in very different ways."

When Huimin*, 26, started dating Jack, he had two female best friends and they were really close. "I went out of my way to befriend them and I'm glad I did," she says. "In no time at all, they were calling me before they called him. Now he calls me a 'friend stealer'!"

So how do you tell the difference between a potential mate and a boyfriend snatcher biding her time? "If this woman is a true friend, she should let him go a bit when you're on the scene," says Li.

On Your Turf

Janice, 28, quickly learnt that dating Steven meant dealing with Emily, his university friend. "Every time we hit the clubs, she'd insist on dancing with him. She'd go, 'This is our song!' and drag him off! She'd also keep pulling him away for private chats."

According to Marshall, this is cause for concern: "Trading secrets is often the currency that builds from an innocent friendship into something that could tip over." That boiling point came for Janice when Steven spent the night out partying with Emily before he went on his three-month exchange trip.

"After we split, Emily called to console me, and I said, 'You're Steven's friend, not mine.' Looking back, I should've given him an ultimatum and asked to choose just one of us to be close to, but I guess I was afraid that he wouldn't pick me."

Draw The Line

"If his best friend is starting to strain your relationship, you need to have a proper conversation with her," says Li. But before you start pointing fingers and looking like an obsessive girlfriend, reflect on your own emotions first. "Often, jealousy stems from your own insecurities. If she's very attractive, work on your own personal grooming to boost your confidence." Your imagination can be your worst enemy, causing you to worry unduly: "Most of the time, it's likely that she's not as perfect as you expect."

The bottom line? If you embrace his other women and set realistic boundaries from the start, you might enjoy sharing the relationship load. But while experts agree that no "one" person can fulfil our every emotional need, you still need to feel like his number-one girl.


